Pastor's Message

My Beloved Church Family,

Notice that this issue of *The Steeple Chimes* says "February – March." That's because Bob and I are taking some long-overdue vacation time in February, so this edition will cover two months.

One of my responsibilities as Pastor includes writing an annual Moderator's / Pastor's Report to the congregation. This report is included in our Annual Report packet, which is distributed at our Annual Meeting. Because our *Steeple Chimes* mailing list includes folks who don't normally attend our Annual Meeting, I'm going to give you a condensed version of my 2021 report.



Report of the Moderator / Pastor - 2021

My 12-week commitment to this church is coming up on two years now. How does the old saying go? People plan, and God laughs. I forgot to listen for God's laughter when I retired from Orient Congregational. God obviously had more plans for me.

A Pastor's call is not just as a faith leader, but also as a CEO. This report talks about both, but leans a bit more heavily on my administrative duties here at First Presbyterian.

Worship Leader: With the exception of two vacation days, I led worship for 50 Sundays, 6 Lenten Services, one Good Friday Service, one Christmas Eve Service, and one Blessing of the Pets Service in 2021. Additionally, I officiated at three Graveside Services for non-members, (Tun Hom on 3/27; Faith Alice Firman on 5/13; Kenneth L. Smith on 10/10); a Funeral Home Service and a Graveside Service for church member Ginny Soergel, on February 19, and two Baptisms (Avery Ann Sanchez on 6/13, and Paris Milani Johnson on 8/21). I officiated at The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on the first Sunday of each month as well as on Ash Wednesday, and officiated at the Installation of Elders on January 31.

Presbytery of Long Island: I am a firm believer in the interconnectedness of the local church and the Presbytery. As such, I faithfully attended meetings of the Northwest Suffolk Presbyterian Clergy Group (we call ourselves HAPLESS). I attended Presbytery meetings on January 30, April 24, and June 26. I also attended the Presbytery Training Session for Elders on February 16, and the Presbytery Training Session for Clerks of Session on February 18. I gave General Presbyter Rev. Mark Tammen an in-person update regarding our church on October 7.

The Presbytery has moved its offices from Commack to West Islip, and was getting rid of books, furniture, and office equipment. We were able to obtain a pulpit to use in the Parlor, several chairs, some office supplies, and 84 hymnals in excellent condition.

Unicameral System of Governance: With 50 members, it did not make any sense for us to have two boards. In January, the congregation voted to go to a unicameral, or one-board system of governance; the Deacons and Session were combined. I feel this has worked very well for us this year.

Another change is that officers are now elected in November. That way, they are able to attend the December Session meeting as an orientation. The budget is now approved by Session in November or December, so that bills may be paid beginning January 1.

Continuing Education: I took a 16-hour course called "Effective Transitional Leadership" on February 24 – 25, with Rev. Arlen Vernava, of The Interim Ministry Network. I taught a Boundary Awareness Training class on Friday, October 22, and earned 6 Continuing Education hours. I attended a Church History class on Friday, November 5, and earned 1.5 Continuing Education hours. I earned an hour for each of the two Presbytery training sessions, bringing the total to 25.5 hours of Continuing Ed.

Steeple Chimes: I write and publish The Steeple Chimes 11 times a year, and thoroughly enjoy doing so. (By the way, we have neither a steeple nor chimes. Just sayin'!)

Women's Choir: With the blessings of Music Director Leonora Colletti and by vote of Session, I have organized and directed a Women's Choir, which has grown to 10 voices. The Choir sang on Easter, Pentecost, Thanksgiving Sunday, and Lessons and Carols Sunday.

Pastor's Office: The Pastor's Offices needed a bit of brightening up, so I painted and wallpapered it. We were given an L-shaped desk by The Congregational Church of Huntington. It's not new, but it works very well for me. Many thanks to Rev. Mark Bigelow and the good people at CCH.

Interim Ministry: Regarding the title of my position - I was in communication with the Committee on Ministry of the Presbytery. Because I am essentially doing the work of an Interim Pastor (basically, making a lot of changes) the Session wondered why I could not have that title. We were informed that (1) Interims needed to be full-time; (2) Interims need to be given benefits; (3) There is a reasonable expectation that a full-time Pastor would follow an Interim. We can't justify a full-time Interim Pastor for a church of 50 members, I don't need benefits, and when we do call a new Pastor, we don't expect that the call will be for a full-time person. Instead, the Presbytery offered me the same title that Pastor Fred had – Temporary Supply. Even though I don't have the title of Interim Pastor, I shall continue to do the interim / transitional work to which this congregation has responded so well.

Church Fair and Christmas Fair: I love Church Fairs! I was in charge of pricing items for the September 25 Church Fair, and ran the December 4 Christmas Fair. These events don't make a ton of money, but they do build fellowship among our members, and are an excellent outreach into the community.

Hosting: Bob and I hosted a luncheon for the congregation on Pentecost Sunday. This was our church's first coffee hour in over a year. On Saturday, July 10, we invited the entire congregation to our home in Greenport. We were thrilled that so many people attended. Mark your calendar for Saturday, July 30, 2022!

New Policy: Our primary purpose as a church is to worship God. At its November meeting, Session adopted a policy that we not rent our building to any outside group on Sundays before 12 noon.

COVID 19: We're being very flexible. Everyone in our church has been vaccinated, and there is plenty of room for social distancing. As of now, masks are required until this latest COVID variant blows over.

Thank you to our staff – Leonora Colletti (Administrative Assistant and director of Music), Debbie Eitel (Fellowship Director), and Gary Prentiss (Custodian) for constantly going above and beyond the call of duty. Thank you to our Webmaster, Irene Lang, for keeping our website up to date. Thank you to our committees and teams for all the work you do. Thank you to retiring Session members Betty Chatfield and Ruth Satterlee for your years of service and for sharing your wisdom. And, thank you to members and friends of FPC Greenlawn for your devotion to our church and to God.

2022 marks our church's 150th year of service to God and humanity. We will be talking very soon about ways we will be celebrating – both big and small. We have a tentative date of Sunday, October 23 for a gala luncheon, so be sure to mark your calendar.

Buildings and Grounds Update

- Snow Removal Service: The committee felt that the service did a good job with the snowstorm of January 7. The snow pole markers have been installed.
- Work Repair Ticket System: The committee agreed to establish a formal reporting system to track all repairs. Details will be discussed at the next meeting.
- Locking Doors on CE Hall: The committee felt that the cost to install locks on the doors to CE Hall was prohibitive.
- Repair of Parking Lot Light: Bob Arelt reported that the search for an electrical contractor to repair the light continues. Four contractors have been called; to date, none has responded.
- Schedule for Major Repairs Projects: The following projects will be pursued in 2022:
 (1) Replace oil tank at manse. The search for a contractor will start next month with the tank removal and replacement scheduled

for June or earlier. We will coordinate the time frame with our tenant.

(2) Renovate bathrooms at church. The exact schedule will be determined when the scope of the project is fully identified at our next meeting.



- Review Building Use Manager Responsibilities: Larry Foray reported the responsibilities he will be undertaking in this new position. This was an FIY, as this position is not a function of the Buildings and Grounds Committee.
- Repair of Broken Stained Glass: The committee inspected the cracked window on the west side of the Sanctuary. Long Island Custom Stained Glass in Huntington Village will be contacted to do the repair. We have used this company in the past, with very satisfactory results.
- The committee will meet on the second Monday of each month.

Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday Services

Session has voted to combine with our friends at Bethany and Sweet Hollow Presbyterian Churches to observe Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday. The Services will be broadcast live on Zoom from Bethany Presbyterian.

Rev. Wade Pond, from Sweet Hollow, will lead the Ash Wednesday Service, Rev. Ann Van Cleef will lead the Maundy Thursday, Service, and Rev. James Rea, of Bethany, will lead the Good Friday Service.

The log-on information for Ash Wednesday may be found on page 3 of this newsletter. Rev. Pond asks the following: "To engage in our time of Ritual Action at our Ash Wednesday Service, you will need some sand or dirt, a small amount of water, a candle, and a small container for mixing purposes."



Wednesday Night Lenten Services

"Is it soup vet?"

The answer is: we don't know. The Session has decided that the Wednesday night Services of March 9 and March 16 will be Zoom-only Services.

At the March 15 Session meeting, a determination will be made regarding the Wednesday night Services of March 23, March 30, and April 6. If the COVID numbers have gone down, we will have our traditional soup supper Service. Stay tuned!

Read the fine Print on Your Gift Cards



New York State Comptroller Thomas P. DiNapoli is urging New Yorkers to spend the gift cards they received this past holiday season in a timely fashion. If not, the money could eventually be turned over to the Office of Unclaimed Funds. In the last seven years, the amount returned to DiNapoli's office in unused gift cards has risen sharply from \$5.8 million in 2014 to \$16 million in 2021.

Every week during the month of February, we are collecting canned soup for our Little Food Pantry.



We are doing this project partnership with The Souper Bowl Caring, nation-wide movement that unites

communities to tackle hunger. This organization inspires people to alleviate hunger on a local level. All of the soup that is collected is given to a charity of the participant's choice; in our case, to our Little Food Pantry.

Started in 1990 at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC, the Souper Bowl of Caring has branched out to include schools, businesses, and congregations of all faiths. In the 30 years of its existence, over \$163 million in food and donations has been raised for local food In 2020 alone, thousands of groups pantries. collected over \$10.6 million in food and contributions.

<u>Roasted Red, White, and Purple Potatoes</u> Ingredients:
