A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols

A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols Service was held on Sunday, December 18.

This Service tells the story of the fall of humanity, the promise of the Messiah, and the birth of Jesus. It is told in nine short Bible readings from Genesis, the Prophetic Books, and the Gospels, and is interspersed with the singing of Christmas carols, hymns, and other music.

The original format was based on an Order of Worship for Christmas Eve, 1880, in Cornwall,

England. It is said that a key purpose of the Service at that time was to keep men out of the pubs on Christmas Eve!

The Service at FPC Greenlawn was based on the one at *The King's College* in Cambridge, England, where the nine lessons are read by representatives of the congregation and of the local community.
