Pastor's Message

My Beloved Church Family,

One would think that those who work for the Lord would never need a vacation. After all, working for God is energizing and exciting! That's true, but we are mere mortals, and once in a while we need a change of scenery.

A few years ago, Bob and I were able to cross something off of our "bucket list" - we took a tour of some National Parks in the western part of the United States. Bob had been there as a young college graduate, but this was my first trip. (Spoiler alert – it was a great trip. If you have not already seen them, put those National Parks on your "bucket list.")

For me, the sights I saw just reaffirmed evidence of the existence of God. "Old Faithful" in Yellowstone really does gush faithfully. In Grand Teton National Park, we visited an Episcopal chapel that had a picture window behind the altar. That view of the mountains was more beautiful than anything a stained-glass window could have depicted.



Arches National Park, with its natural sandstone arches, is truly a wonder. Monument Valley, with its buttes and mesas reaching a thousand feet above the Colorado Valley floor, was breathtaking. The Grand Canyon is aptly named, and is most beautiful at sunset. I liked Bryce Canyon best of all, with its *hoodoos* in various shades of pink and orange resembling the pipes of an organ. And Zion National Park, named so by the Mormons, was certainly a place of peace and refuge, as its Hebrew name implies.

A very interesting part of our trip was the weekend we spent in Salt Lake City at Temple Square. Bob and I spent an entire Saturday at the Mormon Family History Center researching our respective families, and came away with some new information for our family tree. (You are probably aware that the Mormons believe in Baptism by proxy, so when one joins the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, there is an opportunity to have deceased relatives baptized into the church as well. You may not be aware that the Mormons open their genealogical research facilities to non-Mormons at no charge.) On Sunday, we had an opportunity to attend a performance of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, which was a thrill!

There are beliefs in Latter Day Saints theology with which I don't agree. There are also practices that I admire. One of those practices concerns volunteerism. A good and faithful Mormon (I'm not talking about extremists) will give about ten hours a week in volunteer work to his/her local congregation, called a "ward." We saw this in action on the Saturday morning we were there. We had been impressed with the lovely flower gardens in Temple Square. But rather than let the flowers die and go to seed (it was October), scores of people arrived armed with black trash bags, pulled the flowers out of the gardens, and loaded them into a huge

Dumpster. By noon, people and flowers had disappeared, the gardens had been raked, and the sidewalks swept. "Now *that's* what I call a church clean-up day," I said to Bob.

Truth be told, we do have three or four volunteers here at FPCG who put in those kinds of hours. I am grateful to *all* of our volunteers who work for God's Kingdom.

As Paul said in his second letter to Timothy, "I thank God, whom I serve with a clear conscience ... when I remember you constantly in my prayers. I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you ... for God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but a spirit of power and love and self-control."

We're off to a wonderful start in our 2021-2022 program year, and there is more to come. Have a blessed October, and enjoy the beauty of the fall season.

Missions Committee Spotlight: Christian Appalachian Project

The Missions Committee is focusing on five charities this year, in addition to our four Presbyterian offerings. Two are local charities (Huntington Hands Rescue Mission and Harry Chapin's Long Island Cares); one is a local youth project (Long Island Youth Mentoring); one is a national charity (Christian Appalachian Project); and one is international (Mercy Ships).

This article focuses on our national charity: Christian Appalachian Project.

For over 50 years, Christian Appalachian project (CAP) has served the people of Appalachia by building hope, transforming lives, and sharing Christ's love.

Their work started when Rev. Ralph Beiting, a Catholic Priest from northern Kentucky, was assigned to pastor a large portion of east-central Kentucky. Through his outreach, he witnessed tremendous poverty in Appalachia. He saw children weak from hunger, families beaten down by hardship, seniors living in fear and isolation, and communities desperate for hope.

With the help of family and friends, he provided food, clothing, and other essentials to neighbors in need. What started small quickly grew, and Christian Appalachian Project was founded in 1964.

Through donor support, dedicated volunteers, and a selfless staff, CAP now touches the lives of more than one million people each year. By working with other local food banks and humanitarian service providers, their reach extends to parts of all 13 states in the Appalachian region, including Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia.

Each life that is lifted up reflects Christ's love and the generous spirit of their supporters. More information is available on www.christianapp.org.

Buildings and Grounds Update

Buildings and Grounds co-chairs Bob Arelt and Larry Foray have reported that the following projects are being worked on by the Buildings and Grounds Committee:

- The snow removal contract is being bid upon.
- The church heating system annual maintenance has been scheduled.
- Several emergency lights need replacing. This work will be done in October.
- Roof repairs on the portico and hall roofs were done on August 13. These repairs have corrected the leaking that was taking place.
- Handrails for the portico steps have been ordered, and will be installed shortly.
- Electrical repairs, including portico lighting, are being scheduled.
- CE Hall ceiling fans are being replaced.
- Estimates to seal coat the parking lot are being reviewed. Mike Pennino has offered to do the re-striping at no cost to the church.
- A Fall Cleanup Day will be scheduled shortly.

From Our Fellowship Director's Kitchen: Rally Day Punch

Our September 19th Rally Day Brunch was delicious. Many thanks go to Arlissa Dean, Debbie Eitel, Diane Kirchhoff, and George Santos for all of their hard work in preparing this treat for us.

Debbie's "Rally Day Punch" was a big hit. Here is her recipe:

- 1 64 oz bottle of 50% less sugar orange juice (you could use regular OJ, I just happened to buy the lower sugar OJ)
- 1 64 oz bottle of white grape juice
- 1 2-liter bottle of 7-Up soda
- 1 16-oz. (1 lb.) bag of strawberries
- 1 16-oz (1 lb.) bag of peaches

(Target sells the frozen fruit "Good & Gather;" it's their own brand name product)



It was surprisingly tasty, not too sweet, and a little tart. The frozen fruit helps to keep the punch cold without watering it down.

The original recipe was just for the punch - I added the frozen fruit instead of making a fruit & juice ring mold. It was just quicker and easier

World Communion Sunday

Our congregation will celebrate World Communion Sunday on October 3.

World Communion Sunday, originally called World Wide Communion Sunday, was originated in the Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, by Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr in 1933.

1933 was the darkest year of the Great Depression. The clouds of Nazism and Fascism hovered all over Europe. The prevailing mood was anxiety – fear about economics, fear about politics, and fear about the future. As a faith response to these fears, Dr. Kerr and the leaders of his congregation sought to do something both real and symbolic to proclaim that God is God, indeed.

Dr. Kerr and the congregation leaders conceived the idea of a Communion service that followed daylight as it traveled around the globe. The concept spread slowly at first, but was firmly established by World War II.

When we all share the Meal where Christ is our host, we are connected in ways that transcend boundaries of geography and language. Around the Table, we broadcast our faith to the world and say, "Come and dine; there is room for all."
