A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols

A Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols Service will be held on Sunday, December 18, the Fourth Sunday of Advent, at 10:30 a.m.

This Service tells the story of the fall of humanity, the promise of the Messiah, and the birth of Jesus. It is told in nine short Bible readings from Genesis, the Prophetic Books, and the Gospels, and is interspersed with the singing of Christmas



carols, hymns, and other music.

The original format was based on an Order of Worship for Christmas Eve, 1880, in Cornwall, England. It is said that a key purpose of the Service at that time was to keep men out of the pubs on Christmas Eve!

The Service at FPC Greenlawn will be based on the one at *The King's College* in Cambridge, England, where the nine lessons are read by representatives of the congregation and of the local community. We are still looking for community members willing to read. Please see Pastor Ann if you can suggest anyone.

This will be a very inspiring Service of worship. Please plan to attend, and invite a friend!

150th Anniversary Luncheon at Moose Lodge October 23, 2022

One of the highlights of our 150th Anniversary Celebration was having Betty Chatfield read some memories that she had collected from members of our church. Here is what she read:

Good afternoon. I'm here to speak about 'Remembrances', both mine and those of some of our 'older members'. Please know I didn't have opportunity to speak to everyone for one reason or another. And bear in mind there was a lot said to me, and I just pray I can adequately remember all, and do justice to their stories. We may have to do

this again since I've only tapped the surface...and probably to correct any of my errors.

I'll start with <u>Helen Kozlowski</u>, who has been a member 79 year and can't be here. She is one of the nicest people I know and is very independent. She used to come, walking to church, rain or shine for years from several blocks away. She remembers helping out at the Church Fairs and in the church office. Helen wishes us all well.

Barbara Small, who was looking forward to being here, has been a member since she was confirmed about 65 years ago. She says, "I loved Sunday School; I enjoyed all the dinners the church had like the Mother's Day Breakfasts and especially the more recent Lenten Soup Suppers" (where Barbara always helped out calling people from Paumanock Village to remind them when to come and also bringing Wonton Soup to share).

Barbara continued. "I loved the songs the Youth Group would perform for our congregation, and I loved helping out and babysitting all the little kids while their parents were in church. I loved the Bell Choir where Audrey McMahon and Arlissa Dean played. I loved keeping the grounds of church nice raking, planting flowers then watering them. (Barbara was a Deacon; served on different committees especially Building & Grounds. She and Nancy MacIntyre planted so many flowers around the church for so many years, it's a wonder their thumbs didn't permanently turn green).

Barbara ends by saying "We were always a small church but always with a lot of talented and loving people."

Bob & Carol Eitel have been members for more than 50 years. They said, "Our kids were baptized with Rev. Flanders." Bob said, "We remember Dottie Harris who was our kids' Sunday School Teacher. We both remember Rosalie Schweighardt and especially all those people that sat around us at church. It's so wonderful to see Rosalie and her mom, Rosalie Wilson, coming back to our church." (Bob has been on Building & Grounds committee for years & both have helped oversee Coffee hour. Unfortunately, the Eitels couldn't be here as he is still recovering...but we all know & remember their kids, Debbie, Linda, and Janice, and all that they do and have done for FPCG).

<u>Nancy MacIntyre</u> has been a member for 55 years, and is here with daughter, Terry. She says, "I loved

the Living Nativity on the lawn with live animals; Mary rode a donkey, and our own Archangel was lit up on our roof with our youth group children playing little Cherubs. (Our records indicate in the beginning the Living Nativity used to have 2 performances with approx. 800 people for both. We used Town benches that were set-up on our front lawn; police directing traffic with Debbie Eitel, Gary Prentiss, Jill Wilson, and others helping dress our members who played all the roles. It continued to be an outreach for our church for decades, finally moving inside.)

She remembers that Pastor Mike Imperiale would have us singing while he played his guitar saying, "You don't always need to clap when we hear singing as our songs are our praises to the Lord." But she still claps sometimes. (I too remember Michael Imperiale and his playing his guitar saying "I want you all to leave this church with a song in your heart & on your lips.")

Nancy remembers helping out on Partners to Potential, a tutoring program for young children in our community led by Audrey McMahon with Gloria Arelt and others. She remembers we used to run Vacation Bible School every summer, not only with our members but children from the community as well, and we all had matching shirts. (Arlissa Dean reported 69 children one year)

She remembers our 130th church Anniversary when we had an 1872 Worship Service and a lot of us all dressed up in period pieces. Such fun seeing what people came up with wearing. And she remembers fondly Pastor Bob Duncan...he was memorable. (I too remember Bob Duncan who was the first person to ask me to speak from the pulpit. Something I had never wanted to do. However, Pastor Bob reminded me of my Irish grandfather, who was also a pastor, so I thought I HAD to say yes. So here I am. Thank you, Pastor Bob.)

It's good to see Nancy and her daughter, Terry, from California here today.

<u>Diane Hartmann</u> joined around 1978, so she has been a member for 44 years. She says, "I was involved with Tres Dias, and met Pastor Albertson there and joined the church because I liked Pastor Albertson." (Bill & I both remember Gary Albertson. He knocked on our door as we were painting it even before we moved in in 1980. He introduced himself & invited us to his new church. When we joined the new member class, we invited our new neighbors Jim & Arlene Craig to join with

us. Jim later became our Treasurer and COS, and Arlene became a deacon & both our good friends.)

Diane continued. "I liked being useful and helpful...especially as Clerk of Session." (I remember when Diane was moderator of the Deacons, and had the Deacons put on a number of special services for the church...she really made us work.)

Corinne Burdette has been a member since her kids were in Sunday school about 68 years ago. She's here with two of her daughters. She loved going to church and being with the people. She remembers Pastor Flanders and remembers one minister in particular as she had you come to the back of the church and she prayed with you. It was so moving she said, "I became a born-again Christian then. I swear I believe I started speaking in tongues but I don't do that anymore." (I remember Corinne always driving Maria Francis-Henry, her fellow Deacon, for meetings and Sunday Church. She was always ready to help out.) It's good to see Corinne and her daughter here with us today.

Geri Milk has been a member for 47 years. Geri says, "The first time we attended Greenlawn, after trying other churches we (her husband Herman) both immediately felt the presence of the Holy Spirit. We saw people greeting and hugging each other after the service, and we felt at home. We remember getting closer to the people we were sitting with, too. It was then that I felt I heard a voice saying: 'This is where You belong.'".

She says, "I remember the New Member Classes with Pastor Bob Geyer and the friends we met there. Of course, we both remember Pastor Gary Albertson. He was special. I remember the Spooners Program that Meg Lawrence led where we'd bring meals to members of the congregation during a difficult time or an illness."

(I too remember the fine cooks and bakers we've had through the years and the many that contributed such tasty recipes and idea tips to several Greenlawn Cook Books that encouraged us all to have family meals together, virtually saying there is "Nothin' as lovin' as something from the oven." Bill and my family still enjoy a lot of these recipes to this day.)

Geri remembers Couples Club and Lenten Soup Suppers, and Herman with his "special bread knife." (I too remember Herman in the kitchen overseeing the cutting of those wonderful loaves of homemade bread. Everyone at the time had a bread machine, but I was squishing the bread when I cut it so I got an animated cutting lesson that day from Herman that I've used successfully my whole life).

Geri continues: "While Herman was a Deacon, I only served as Superintendent of Sunday School for 20 years, setting up balloons for Rally Day, and calling children and their parents for all the Easter and Christmas events that were held. I had a lot more help after Herman passed. (I remember all the needlepoint Crosses Geri made selling them at church events...even at the hospital when she had to go...turning all the money over to the church...to this day. Such a blessing! Good to see Geri here.

<u>Mildred Bachmann</u> has been a member for 67 years. She is sorry she can't be with us today and sends her greetings. (Mildred served on a special finance team when she could. A very gracious woman, someone who always had a smile on her face; you could always count on her.

Bob & Gloria Arelt have both been members for 41 years. They said, "The most enjoyable time for us was teaching Sunday school. We followed our youngest child, Tom, up through his 4th grade. And we both enjoyed serving on Committees, sharing time, and getting to know other folks.

(I remember Bob as head of B&G forever, as well as Personnel; you could always find him fixing something around the church. Gloria was always active too, in prayer groups and church circles.) It's good to see Bob & Gloria here with us today.

Ruth Satterlee has been a member for 55 years. Ruth says: I loved the times when my kids were Christened and Confirmed. I've always loved it when the hymn "Let There Be Peace on Earth" was sung. (We all liked it when Grandma Ruth was able to bring her grandchildren, Parker & Payton, to church, and now love that her son Craig is so active in church too).

Pat & Ron Lievendag Pat had been a member for over 50 years. She was our Church Secretary and eventually led the Children's Choir. Eventually Ron joined, too, and proved to be so helpful, especially with our sound equipment.

Betty & Bill Chatfield Bill said, "We've only been members for about 40 years." This is some of what I remember starting back in the late 90's.

I remember Hank Bugden chaired Finance, and wrote our manual to cover every facet of our church to explain what needs to be done and how to do it.

What I really remember was back in 1999 when everyone was awaiting the start of the New Millennium. I'd been asked to be an Elder for a while. I still hadn't said yes but when the Hank Bugdens moved from #5 Carrol Place, just down the block from I live, and the fact that he had just one year left on his term to fill, I felt God was truly knocking on my door, so I had to say yes. (Thank you, Henry, and good to see daughter Gail here today).

I remember Bob Brant starting the Flowering of the Cross at Easter time. We remember with joy our kids and grandkids putting flowers on the Easter Cross.

We remember going to a dinner Christmas Eve with our kids then all enjoying the beautiful Midnight Service.

I remember weekend spiritual retreats, especially one where we learned the Fruits of the Spirit among other blessed things.

I remember all the special music our church has had. We are so blessed to have such beautiful acoustics at Greenlawn. We've enjoyed special music every Sunday under the direction of so many special musical directors. We've been blessed with many special performances; opera arias, American standards; our own choir, and other church choirs coming here to perform. I remember one Harlem Choir particularly, and their stories of salvation. We've been gifted with the musical talents of so many of our members, their children and friends, and our own SpiritLifters who started here with Bob Brant, and continues with our own Debbie Eitel delighting and inspiring so many.

I remember Maria Hottinger dragging me all over different places securing things for the church...especially the time we got sofas, chairs and carpets from Huntington Town House Catering Hall when they were closing. She was a dynamo and knew how to get things donated and delivered for free. Maria still joins us on Zoom on Sundays.
