### Pastor's Message

My Beloved Church Family,

I don't make New Year's resolutions any more, because it's hard to keep them for 365 days. But it's easy to keep resolutions for a month at a time, so that's what I'm doing.

I observed "Dry January" last month, and was successful in not drinking any wine for 31 days! (I don't care for beer or any of the "hard stuff.")

Normally, I drink a lot of Diet Coke, so for the month of February, I have given up soft drinks. Who knows? Maybe I'll end up giving up Diet Coke on a permanent basis, because it's really not good for the digestive system.



What to do in March, which also encompasses most of Lent? I thought of giving up cookies, but perhaps I should do something more spiritual. After praying about it, I discerned that I should tithe to our church.

"Are you saying my Pastor doesn't already tithe? Shame on her!"

Tithing has been a goal toward which I have been working for a long time. Between this church, my home church (Baiting Hollow Congregational), and various charities, I'm making progress, but I'm not there yet.

Scripture says that tithing is a way to show our trust in God. Tithing isn't for God's benefit. Let's face it – God does not need our money. Tithing is for *our* benefit, because sacrificing a portion of our income reminds us to rely on God for our needs.

If a person tithes, it doesn't necessarily mean that (s)he is a good Christian. And, if a person does not tithe, it doesn't mean (s)he is a bad Christian. Tithing is a spiritual practice, rather than a financial one. It's not about money, it's about the heart. It's about the realization that we have been abundantly blessed.

People who have done this tell me that they have been blessed above and beyond anything they could have imagined. So, during the month of March, I'm going to keep a daily log of ways I have been blessed, and I will report back to you in April.

Would you like to join me? You don't have to tell me about it if you don't want. But you decide to join me, I encourage you to keep track of the blessings you receive that are above and beyond your expectations. You might be surprised.

#### LET PEOPLE CARE FOR YOU From: The Beauty of Caring by Lloyd John Ogilvie

A dynamic expression of caring is to be able to receive caring. Let people love you! But that means to be vulnerable. People cannot care about us if they do not know our needs. We give people a special gift when we become honest and open about what's happening to and around us. Independence and self-reliance block deep caring. A person who refuses to be cared for by others will usually end up caring little about the people around him.

Share your needs, ask for others' prayers, seek their insight and wisdom. Your openness will create an openness in the people you want to help. It takes a lot of energy to keep the façade of adequacy. The mask brings strained relationships. People feel put down and guilty in the presence of a person who pretends to "have it all together."

We begin to become caring persons when we let God care for us. Then our hearts are set on fire with care for others. But the "I'm going to care for you!" attitude often sets up resistance in the very people about whom we care. Asking them for their care for you is often the first step in preparing an openness for you to care for them. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. 
Wednesday, February 22: Our Ash Wednesday Communion Service will be incorporated into our first Lenten Soup Supper of the year at 6:00 p.m.

Paul Nixon is a noted author and lecturer on church growth and development. An ordained Minister in the United Methodist Church, he is President of The Epicenter Group, a




coaching and leadership development organization based in Washington, DC.
