Pastor's Message

My Beloved Church Family,

One of the things that I do as I prepare to publish *The Steeple Chimes* each month is to look over last year's corresponding edition to make sure that I haven't missed anything important. That's how I ended up reading my *Pastor's Message* from last July, and was reminded how uncertain life was as we were dealing with a closed church building and wondering what the future held for us.

We've come a long way since then. We're worshiping together in the Sanctuary (and in the Parlor during July and August) once more, and we've resumed coffee hours. Great things are happening buildings and groundswise, including the refurbishing of the church office, the installation of wainscoting in the front hallway, and, in particular, the renovation of the choir room. Governance-wise, we have gone to a unicameral board and restructured many of our committees. In particular, the Missions Committee



has enjoyed a resurgence, and our Little Food Pantry is available to the community 24/7.

The pandemic forced us to make some changes that we never would have made on our own. We streamlined our Order of Worship, and most of our committee and Session meetings now take place via Zoom. We also learned to simulcast our Sunday morning Services, enabling homebound and out-of-town friends and members to participate.

Could we have predicted all of this a year ago? I don't think so. But God was there for us. It always amazes me that no matter happens in life, God has a solution. God's ways are not only perfect, but they're much more exciting than our ways ever could be.

Sadly, this summer won't be perfect. COVID-19 is still out there. Food, gasoline, and building materials are getting expensive. Some may see this as a half-empty glass, but we can allow God to show us how that glass is really half-full.

This summer, we at FPC Greenlawn will be in "planning mode." The Vision Team has a lot of ideas for the coming year, and we have a Church Fair coming up at the end of September. Furthermore, we have to start talking about how we're going to celebrate our church's 150th Anniversary Year in 2022. Yes, our future is bright, indeed!

Future plans include the redecorating of the lobby area outside of the choir room, which now has to be re-named.

Although several people helped with the project, both financially and with "sweat equity," Larry Foray did 95% of the work, thus saving the church many thousands of dollars. We owe him a big "Thank you."

From the Pastor's Kitchen: Grandma Teresa's Spaghetti Sauce

Grandma never followed a written recipe. She just threw in a handful of this and a pinch of that. It took me years to come close to duplicating her spaghetti sauce. This is what I came up with, and it tastes pretty authentic!

1 onion

Olive oil

2 Cans Contadina tomato paste w/ Italian spices

2 (15 oz) cans diced tomatoes

1 pkg Italian sweet sausage

Julienne the onion and sauté in olive oil in a large pot.

Stir in the tomato paste.

Rinse out the cans, with about 3/4 can of water each, and add the water to the pot. Stir.

Do the same with the diced tomatoes.

Add the sausage, cut in pieces.

Depending upon where the tomatoes came from, you may need to add a fistful of sugar. Also, if you're inclined, a cup of white wine will never hurt. (Then add another cup to the sauce!) Simmer for at least 2 hours, stirring occasionally. Don't cover the

pot while the sauce is simmering – you want it to reduce and thicken. Don't use a slow cooker. Also, don't add chicken to the sauce while



it's cooking; it will make the sauce very tart. It may be cooked a day or two ahead. The sauce also freezes well.

When I was a little girl, I thought that the best meal in the world was leftover spaghetti. In fact, I once told my mother, "When I get married, I'm going to serve my husband leftover spaghetti for his first dinner!" I'm sure my mother smiled.

The truth is, the longer you simmer spaghetti sauce, the better it tastes. I have been known to simmer it for 12 hours.

And, as far as leftovers are concerned, I've learned that spaghetti is very sloppy. In our house, we eat leftover rigatoni.
